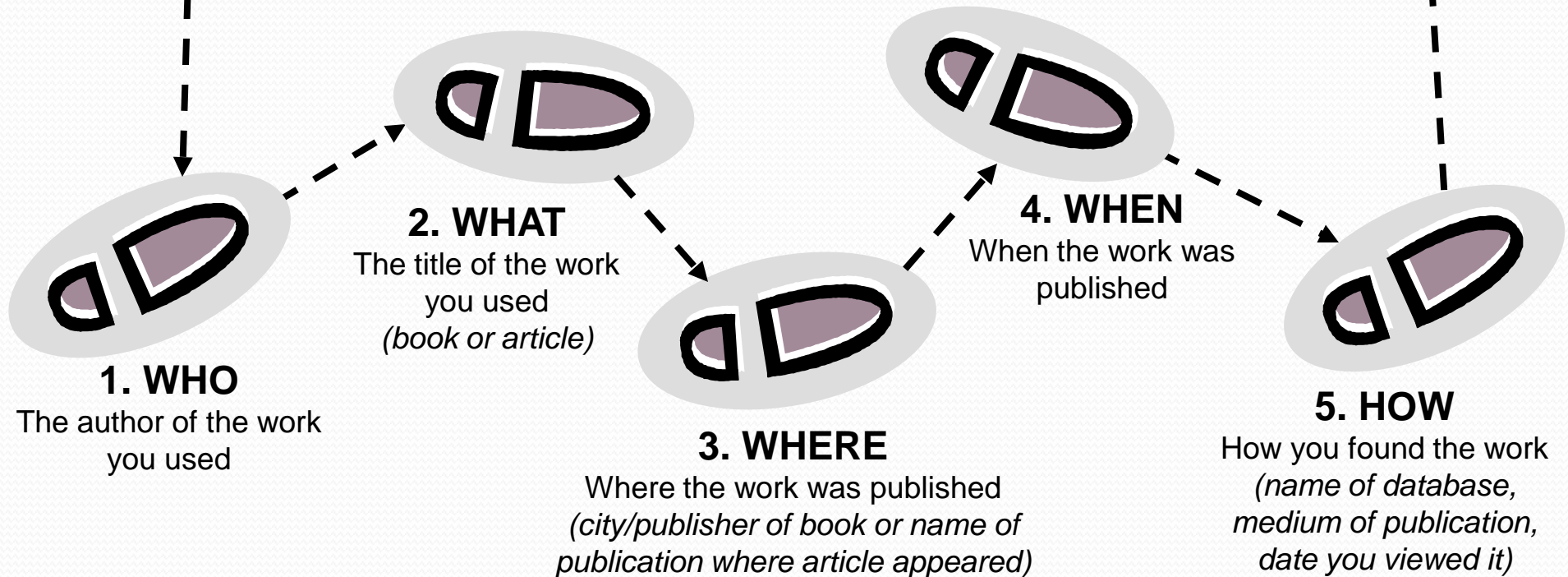

- If your source does not provide an author, skip that field
- Capitalize important words in titles of articles and publications
- Use the styles and punctuation shown in the table
- Convert any underlined source information to *italics*
