#### PARCC

The PARCC
Performance
Based Assessment will
be administered in our
district on
March 3, 4

(Mathematics units) and March 5, 6 and 9 (English Language Arts Units), and the End of Year Assessment will be administered this year on April 20, 21 (Mathematics Units) and

(Mathematics Units) and April 22 and 23 (English Language Arts Units).

The Assessments will measure student achievement in the areas of Mathematics and Language Arts Literacy. Students enrolled in Algebra I, Geometry, or Algebra II, and English 9, 10, or 11 will participate in the PARCC assessment on the days listed above. Seniors in the Class of 2015 will not participate in PARCC as they have met their graduation requirement via the HSPA.

All students being tested need to come to school at their regular time. We will be following the two and a half hour delayed opening bell schedule once testing for that day has ended. Seniors and students not being tested may report to school at 10:00 AM and report to either the new gym and/or the Route 31 entrance.

Supervision of non-tested students who need to arrive at the regular time will be available in the new gym via the Regional Road entrance. A regular Polytech bus schedule will be run for

those students not being tested so they can report to North Hunterdon at the normal time for the bus to Polytech.

# PARCC Testing Day Requirements

On assessment days, the following is required of all students being tested:

- 1. Students must bring their fully charged Chromebook to school and Chromebook charger.
- 2. Students must also bring earbuds or headphones for the audio portions of the tests.
- 3. Students should have nothing with them other than their fully charged Chromebook, Chromebook charger, earbuds, two No. 2 pencils, a calculator (for math on March 2 and March 3) and their student ID or driver's license.
- 4. NJDOE directives prohibit backpacks, handbags, cell phones, any other electronic devices, food, and water bottles in the testing areas. Please remind your child to leave these items in their lockers during testing.
- 5. Attendance will be taken in each testing room daily, so students must report directly to their designated classroom each morning at 7:45AM.
- 6. Every student must present a North Hunterdon High School ID card or a driver's license each day of testing to verify identity.

7. Students who miss any section due to illness will be advised by their guidance counselor concerning makeup testing dates and location for the specific test that was missed.

#### **HSPA**

Seniors who have not met the HSPA graduation requirement will test on March 3, 4 and 5. Make up tests will take place on March 10, 11 and 12.




# February Athlete of the Month—Alyssa Ma


Here are some basic thoughts on sportsmanship:

# Please order all AP Exams by Friday, March 13, 2015.

The cost is \$91 per test and must be paid at the time of ordering. Students need to bring their completed registration form and a check made payable to

NHHS Activities Account to the main office. Please do not hand checks or registration forms to the classroom teacher. Ms. Ellis, in the Principal's office, will record and process all registrations and checks. Please write on the check the exams that your child will be taking, and please record the child's last name if different than that on the check.

A reminder to all students and parents is that course weighting is dependent upon participation in the AP Exams. Students who take the AP Exam for a course will receive the full AP.50 quality point for GPA calculations. Students who choose not to participate in an AP Exam for a course will receive Honors Weighting .35 quality point for GPA calculations. Weighting is not dependent upon the AP Exam Grade; only participation in the exam for that course is considered.

## ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery)



On Thursday, March 19, 2015, all Sophomores will take the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) Test at 8:00 a.m. in the New Gym. It is important to note that taking this test does not imply

that a student is interested in the military and is <u>not obligated to any of the armed services</u> for taking the test. This test is a key component of the North Hunterdon High School's Personalized Student Learning Plan.

The ASVAB test is a comprehensive career test that includes the most widely used multiple aptitude test battery in the world. The ASVAB program also offers an interest inventory and other activities designed to help students explore the world of work and gain confidence in making career decisions. The results of the aptitude test and interest inventory enable students to evaluate their skills, estimate their performance in academic and vocational endeavors, and identify potentially satisfying careers.

The ASVAB test consists of eight sections containing 200 items and requires three hours to complete. The sections include the following: general science, arithmetic reasoning, word knowledge, paragraph comprehension, mathematics knowledge, electronics information, auto/shop in-

formation, and mechanical comprehension. General goals of the test include having students learn more about themselves and the world of work, exploring occupations in line with their interests, and developing an effective strategy to realizing their career goals.

The ASVAB test is designed to be helpful to virtually all students, whether they are planning on pursuing a four year college, two year college, vocational school or entering the workforce after high school.

# **Future Business Leaders of America**

Participating students took on the role of a corporate business leader by making decisions to steer their business to success. Student teams made decisions that affect the profitability and sustainability of their virtual company, and attempt to outperform competitors in profit, sales, and market share. Students set prices, determine production levels, invested in capital, develop budgets, and plan marketing and research. The competition involved 125 teams from the NJ FBLA high school chapters. The top 8 teams progressed to the final round which was held at Johnson & Johnson's ("J&J") Ethicon offices where the students participated in both the competition and a job shadow experience where various J&J executives discuss their roles at J&J and the overall J&J business.

### **Community Service**

As educators, we not only wish to develop our students' intellectual abilities, but also their sense of duty to the greater community of mankind. In our mission statement, we say to attest to our belief that students in our charge must become responsible citizens of the world.

Each school year, our voluntary community service goal for Seniors and Juniors is to complete a minimum of 40 hours, for Sophomores to complete a minimum of 30 hours, and for Freshmen to complete a minimum of 20 hours. ### **American Mathematics Competition (AMC)**

The Mathematical Association of America
AMERICAN MATHEMATICS COMPETITIONS

On Tuesday, February 3, 2015 we held our annual American Mathematics Competition (AMC). We had

260 participants – 160 students sat for the AMC 12 contest and 100 students took the AMC 10 contest.

For more than 60 years, students across the country have taken up the challenge of America's longestrunning and most prestigious math contests, The American Mathematics Competitions (AMC). Every year, at thousands of schools in every state, more than 350,000 students are presented with a set of questions rich in content, designed to make them think and sure to leave them talking. Dedicated to strengthening the mathematical capabilities of our nation's youth, the AMC program identifies, recognizes, and rewards excellence in mathematics through a series of national contests including the AMC 10 and AMC 12.





### **Black History Month**

The history department held lessons and activities discussing Black History during the month of February.

- United States History I students reviewed the contributions of African Americans to the war effort, including but not limited to, the Tuskegee Airmen, the Double V campaign to defeat racism and the migration of African Americans into industrial cities to assist with the war effort at home. Special focus granted to Dorie Miller, who was the first African American to earn the Navy Cross for his heroic efforts during the Pearl Harbor attack.
- Advanced Placement United States History students spent several days the week of February 9th examining the ways in which African Americans encountered institutional racism in the late 1800s and how that institutional racism has had a lasting impact on the opportunities available to the African American community in the United States. Students began the week taking a 1963 literacy test from the state of Alabama that was designed to disenfranchise African American voters. We explored the creation of Jim Crow laws in the South and the spent time discussing the valiant attempts of individuals like Homer Plessy. The week ended with students watching a video clip on the pervasiveness of lynching as a form of social control in the Southern United states from the 1880s through the 1930s.
- World History classes used the following activity from the Academy Awards as a current event/Black History activity. John Legend and Common performed the song "Glory" from the movie soundtrack for Selma. The video and the song depict the "Bloody Sunday" civil rights march led by Martin Luther King, Jr. across the Edmund Pettis Bridge in Selma, Alabama. The protesters were beaten viciously in front of media and press eliciting further sympathy for the cause of Civil Rights and leading to the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Video discussed along with the progress and obstacles remaining toward Martin Luther King, Jr.'s vision of a colorblind society.

- AP Government students debated the controversial executive actions of President Lincoln after the attack on Fort Sumter. One of the debates we had in class dealt with the controversies surrounding the Emancipation Proclamation. Students received a good understanding of why this is controversial through the lens of Constitutional Law and also examined the need for the 13th Amendment towards the end of the war. We had a brief discussion afterwards relating our debate to Black History Month. Throughout the year, we spend a great deal of time discussing the Civil Rights Movement. Major highlights include the leadership of Martin Luther King Jr., NAACP, Jim Crow South, Civil Rights Acts of 1960s, and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.
- United States History II students worked on a sourcing activity involving the history of blacks in Texas. We will talk about how
  under the various leaderships (Spain/Mexico), blacks were generally free and Mexicans even treated them equally. Still, some
  blacks fought for independence for Texas. There were several black heroes during the War for Independence, and that will be
  the focus of the lesson. However, once Texas became independent and subsequently a state, blacks were treated poorly, and
  Sam Houston even made a law telling blacks had two years to leave or risk becoming slaves.

The Student Council participated in Aeropostale's annual Teens for Jeans Campaign. One of three homeless people in the United States are teenagers and Aeropostale and NHHS are helping to make a difference. Despite the inclement weather, the students successfully collected

two large bins of jeans, for a grand total of 117 pairs, and delivered them to Aeropostale for local distribution.
