Students are required to arrive no later than 7:45 a.m. for the morning administration; 12:00 p.m. for the afternoon administration. Students will not be dismissed until an exam has officially ended. Do not ask to leave early if you finish before the end of the test, as your request will be denied. 

News from the Student Assistance Counselor

The "improbable PLAYERS" are going to be at NHHS on May 5th at 7:45am for all sophomores. The program "I'll never do that" is the Players' original and best-loved performance that presents a spectrum of scenes about the roller coaster of drinking/drug use. The play offers short and mostly humorous scenes about beer vs. pot, wacky advertising, drinking and driving, and ends with a story about a family torn apart by alcoholism - how they are all affected - and how they all deal with it. The program will be approximately 1 and 1/2 hours in the theater

On Friday, May 29th, NHHS will be hosting Katie Koestner as she presents her program "No-Yes" a story about sexual assault to juniors and seniors from 7:50 to 8:50 a.m. in the Theater. Katie Koestner has been a leader in the movement to end sexual violence since she took her own solo stand as the first survivor of date rape to speak out nationally at age 18. After appearing on the cover of Time Magazine on June 3, 1991, Katie worked with HBO to make a film about her story. Subsequently, she has appeared on nearly 50 national television programs, spoken at more than 1500 campuses and led over 400 Take Back The Night marches and rallies. Her emotionallycharged presentation creates an environment of understanding and helps lay the groundwork for behavioral transformation. Her program provides students with just the right blend of facts, statistics, realism, and thoughtprovoking challenges around relationships, respect, alcohol, and decision-making.

Alive at 25



North Hunterdon-Voorhees Regional High School District is greatly concerned with the safety of its student drivers. Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death among young drivers with less than two years experience. There-

fore, we have implemented a mandatory program, "Alive at 25," for all parents and students that anticipate driving on campus during their senior year. The "Alive at 25" program will address the operational, psychological, and physical aspects of driving.

The **student program** was conducted during the school day in November 2014 for juniors who had health first semester and in April 2015 for juniors who have health second semester. This is a program designed to persuade student drivers to take responsibility for their behavior in driving situations and adopt safe driving practices.

The parent program will be offered on a variety of evenings in May. The program will consist of a 1.5 hour presentation to assist parents in understanding and managing the journey of their teens as they progress from beginners to independent drivers. Information will be provided that offers practical information for parents to use in reducing teen crash risks. The program will be offered at 7:00p.m. on Tuesday, May 5, Wednesday, May 13 and Monday, May 18 in the North Hunterdon High School Theater. Additional information can be found on the North Hunterdon website. Parents must attend only one of the three nights. If you have attended the program within the last two academic years (2013-2014 or 2014-2015), you do not need to attend again. If you are unable to attend one of the three nights at NHHS, you are able to attend the program at Voorhees High School. The dates for the VHS program are June 3, 2015 at 2:45p.m. and at 7:00p.m. then June 4, 2015 at 7:00p.m. All are in the VHS auditorium.

In order for students to be eligible for parking permits in the 2015-2016 school year, please be advised that both student and parent must attend their designated *Alive at 25* program *prior* to approval for a parking permit.


Graduation 2015

April was Math Awareness Month



Mathematics Awareness Month was created to increase public understanding of and appreciation for mathematics. It began in 1986, when President Reagan issued a proclamation establishing National Mathematics Awareness Week. Activities for Mathematics Awareness Month generally are organized on local, state and regional levels by college and university departments, institutional public information offices, student groups, and related associations and interest groups.

Each year, the Joint Policy Board for Mathematics sponsors Mathematics Awareness Month to recognize the importance of mathematics through written materials and an accompanying poster that highlight mathematical developments and applications in one particular area. Innovation is an increasingly important factor in the growth of world economies. It is especially important in key economic sectors like manufacturing, materials,

energy, biotechnology, healthcare, networks, and professional and business services. The advances in and applications of the mathematical sciences have become drivers of innovation as new systems and methodologies have become more complex. As mathematics drives innovation, it also drives careers. This year's theme is *Mathematics Drives Careers* and theme posters will be displayed in each math classroom.

To kick-off the month-long observance, students are competing to find the best math slogan/design of their interpretations of the theme and other mathematical musings. The winners will be painting their design on one of the breezeway windows on April 27. Each day a student will be recognized as the Math Student of the Day and will be presented a certificate during their math class. A month long contest will be held to guess the number of Starbursts™, Skittles™, and pennies in jars displayed in the showcase windows in the math wing. The student whose guess is the closest to the correct number will win the candy or the money in the jars. And finally, each day a fun fact or trivia question about one of the math teachers will be announced during the morning announcements and students will try to guess which math teacher it describes. Latin Students Tour the Metropolitan Museum of Art

On Friday, April 17th, 35 Latin III and AP Latin students attended a field trip to the Metropolitan Museum of Art. The students arrived at the museum at 6:00 pm and ran through a course of three different activities. The students had the opportunity to tour the Greek and Roman exhibits, listening to the audio tour provided by the museum. In this, they were able to learn about whichever works of art intrigued them most. The students also had a guided "scavenger hunt" on which they had to answer a series of questions regarding specific works of art, including wall paintings from the Villa of P. Fannius Synistor, a comparison of two Hercules statues and an analysis of a funerary urn. Lastly, they were taken on a guided tour by Mrs. Mullay who keyed in on 8 specific works of art. The students started their tour at an Ionic Column from the Temple of Artemis from 300 BC. The massive 11 foot column would have stood 56 feet tall in its original position. They then walked through and discussed various funerary urns and inscriptions, using their knowledge of Latin to translate the inscriptions. They marveled at the detail in the "Four Seasons Sarcophagus" and were blown away by the intricate detail in the relief depicting Dionysus riding on a panther. After that, discussion centered around imperial portraiture, comparing Augustus and Caligula to the Antonine emperors. The students concluded their tour in a fully restored bedroom with the finest example of 2nd style wall paintings in the world. The students were finally able to experience first-hand the culture and artifacts of the Romans about whom they have been studying for years. It was an eye-opening and lifechanging experience for them. Special thanks to Mr. Fario, Ms. Ortiz, and Ms. Soska for chaperoning the trip on a Friday night.
