Congratulations to the Class of 2012!

ith a little luck from Mother Nature, a week that began with rain ended with clear skies just in time for the graduation ceremonies of North Hunterdon and Voorhees High Schools, which were once again held outside on the football fields. Spirits were high on Friday, June 8, 2012 as 261 students received their diplo-

mas from Voorhees High School and 430 students graduated from North Hunterdon High School.

The Voorhees ceremony began at 5:00pm with a welcome address by Senior Class President Erin Knabe. At the end of

The competition was cancelled due to weather and moved to June 8 at 5:00pm—same time as graduation. "Both graduating and competing for a state title is something the three of us have worked to achieve for the past four years.

Both are once in a lifetime opportunities. The three of us were torn," said Erin. To help make their decision easier, Principal Ron Peterson quickly began making arrangements for a second ceremony to take place that morning for Erin, Harrison and Bhavin. The track team sent out mass text messages and Facebook posts to their class-

mates and the custodians began making arrangements.

Luckily in the end, the Meet of Champions was moved to Monday, June 11 so Erin, Harrison and Bhavin could join their fellow graduates at the ceremony. "I am so grateful to be here graduating with my

Touching the Future Through a Transit (by Teri Bellows, VHS teacher)

his surpasses Einstein's time travel: here's how a 10% chance of clear skies has managed to change the future.

The Voorhees High School Astronomy Club planned for months to see the Transit of Venus. This special alignment, when from Earth we can see the planet Venus move across the disc of the Sun, takes place only twice in over 100 years (most recently in 2004 and 2012). Astronomy Club Officer, Rachel Jones, designed beautiful blue and yellow transit shirts to celebrate this once in lifetime moment. Club President Lauren Pepperman designed a children's handout, organized tasks and ran meetings.

The mental images of June 5, 2012 were of sunny days, blue skies and the last week of school. So when the weather report called for overcast skies, showers and only a 10% chance of some clearing, Club Advisor and Voorhees Teacher, Ms. Teri Bellows, suggested the students all watch a transit simulcast. That afternoon. however, a small group of students came to ask if they could go to the county Mountain Farm field at Teetertown Ravine as planned and hope

for that 10% break in the clouds. They loaded a 12" Dob, a dedicated H-alpha, and a sunspotter into a SUV along with a box of brochures and transit shirts. Three students called the rest of the members and everyone met at the field at 5:45pm - in the rain.

By 6:00pm, the rain had stopped and a clear patch seemed to be moving closer, so the students unpacked and set up the telescopes on tarps with the professional help of club alumnus, and NJ Astronomical Association Qualified Observer, Mitchell Revalski. Mitch surprised everyone by showing up even though it was his 21st birthday! Eighteen VHS Astronomy Club members, all wearing matching blue transit shirts and huge smiles, dispersed among the telescopes as the clear blue patch grew closer and larger.

At second contact, with Venus just inside the edge of the Sun, there were woops and cheers as the club members finally witnessed the historic event they had been waiting for. More cars started arriving and within 30 minutes the Astronomy Club was joined by guests, including over a dozen children that were wide-eyed and smiling. Three NJAA members came with telescopes and several more arrived to observe and interact with the crowd. At one point, 55 people of all ages were present for the event, and everyone was animated and impressed, looking through all the telescopes, and usually more than once. It was easy to take pictures of the transit through the telescopes and the sunspotter, and everyone with a camera had a perfect souvenir. Nine-year old Joseph

→ March 27, 2012 Meeting:

- Board approved the budget for the 2012-2013 school year. The budget includes no increase to the local tax levy.
- Board recognized NHHS music teacher, Perry Andrews, as the district's nomination for Teacher of the Year to be considered in the state selection.
- Board's attorney reviewed reapportionment of the Board caused by 2010 Census, including changes to seats and terms and who would need to run in next school election.

→ April 24, 2012 Meeting:

- Board accepted a donation of 10,000 pedometers from Linda Szych, employed by Sanofi US, to be used by students in physical education classes.
- Board approved an application to NJ Dept. of Education for available funding for anti-bullying expenses.
- Board accepted \$500 donation from Exxon in support of annual Science Expo.

→ May 15, 2012 Meeting:

- Board appointed school officials and professional consultants for 2012-2013 school year.
- Board approved revised meeting calendar with dates through January 2013 (due to school elections being moved to November)

→ June 19, 2012 Meeting:

- Board accepted final approval from NJDOE regarding capital projects (roof replacement at NHHS and generator and HVAC replacements at VHS). Projects to begin in summer 2012.
- Board approved proposal from NHHS Booster Club to renovate JV softball and baseball fields at NHHS.
- Board accepted a \$50,000 donation from NHHS Booster Club to replace scoreboard on Singley football field.
- Board accepted sponsorship by U.S. Coast Guard for the VHS Girls Soccer program, which includes donation of logo t-shirts for practice, logo soccer balls and water bottles.
- Board accepted a Safety Grant from NJSBAIG/Eric West in the amount of \$41,100 to be used for security upgrades.
- Board approved visit by up to nine high school students from Germany to attend Voorhees in October 2012.
